Research Design

- Clarifying your variables in the research project
 - Dependent variable
 - Independent (explanatory) variable(s)
 - Intervening variable(s)
- ▶ Endogeneity in social science research (p. 25)
 - ► The problem: mutual impacts of the dependent and independent variables
 - Possible solutions
 - Searching for instrumental variable(s) (IV)
 - Using IV to estimate the causal impact of endogenously correlated explanatory variable

Assessing the four propositions

- The more insecure the regimes (of regional states), the less intrusive are their regional institutions.
- The design of regional institutions in the developing world has been more consistently sovereignty-preserving than sovereign-eroding.
- Functional imperatives are less important than ideational and normative considerations in shaping the design of regional institutions in the developing world.
- The contrast between the design features of the EU and regional institutions in the developing world can be overstated in relation to the commitment to supranationalism and the development of a regional identity.
